Essential Writing Skills

In an effort to identify essential writing skills and competencies in our students, the teachers who took the August, 2008 Lucy Calkins' writing class discussed what writing skills, especially in conventions, they expected the majority of students entering their grade level and exiting their grade level to do with competency and automaticity.

The charts below are offered for guidance as teachers decide what skills to teach and stress to their students.
